CONVENTION NOTES

THE IMPORTANCE OF GRADUATE TRAINING BEYOND THE BACCALAURATE DEGREE IN THE PROFESSIONAL WORLD

Mrs. Dorothy S. Potts, Moderator Dr. H. J. Masson

Mrs. Dorothy S. Potts, President of Radio Magazines, Inc., moderator, introduced the subject by citing that the number of bachelor degrees awarded annually in this country has risen over 500% since 1920. as against a 50% increase in population during the same period. "This no longer makes the college graduate the impressive figure he was in 1920." Mrs. Potts continued. "The man to be reckoned with now, is the one with the graduate degree. Thirty years ago, outside the educational field, these degrees were practically unknown. Today, they are everywhere. This country, which is always making two blades of grass grow where one grew before, has succeeded within this period, in making six doctors and ten masters grow where one grew before." Mrs. Potts opened for discussion the question of whether the time, money and enormous energy necessary to obtain these degrees were well spent.

Dr. H. J. Masson, Assistant
Dean of the Graduate Division of
New York University, College of Engineering, discussed the problem
from an educator's point of view.
"The field of engineering," he said,
"has been expanding both in coverage
and depth of treatment, so that today
the term 'technology' would be more
descriptive than engineering. As a
result, many topics are deleted or
only incompletely treated in the undergraduate curriculum due to the lack
of time or inadequate background.

Experience has shown that in certain activities, women have superior aptitudes. One of these is in the field of research. However, to qualify for desirable positions where these aptitudes find their best application, graduate study is increasingly necessary."

On the other hand, Miss Marian O'Sullivan, of the Personnel Department of Western Electric Company, expressed the opinion that, while a graduate degree may be desirable, it is not necessary in the field of production engineering. "The graduate program may give prestige to an individual," said Miss O'Sullivan, "but additional pertinent courses in a specific field may be more advantageous."

Miss Mary Louise Pottle, Sales Engineer with Allis Chalmers Manufacturing Company, Boston District, agreed, "In sales engineering, a general engineering background is necessary, but additional study in business administration and English composition might be more valuable than advanced engineering training.

Dr. Cornelia Snell, member of Foster D. Snell, Inc., Consulting Chemists-Engineers, was in favor of graduate study to enable a woman to specialize in a particular field and gain experience in research, before entering the engineering profession.

The establishment of a new engineering award was announced by Miss Beatrice A. Hicks, President of the Society, at the Third Annual Convention.

The award will be made annually to a woman in recognition of her significant contribution to engineering. It is intended to encourage women in their professional work and education. The first award will be made in 1952.

The honor will be conferred on a person in the field of engineering design, research, education, or administration. Nominations for the award will be accepted from Society members or from non-members familiar with the field.

Miss Elsie Eaves and Miss Stella Lawrence are in charge of this Committee.

IN HEHORIAH

Mrs. Henrietta Wolf Bernhard, a charter member of the Society of Women Engineers, died on February 6, 1951, in the wreck of the Pennsylvania Railroad's "Broker" at Woodbridge, New Jersey.

Mrs. Bernhard, a graduate of Newark College of Engineering, was one of the first women in New Jersey to be awarded a degree in Civil Engineering. She was employed by the New Jersey Turnpike Commission doing construction engineering.

HISS HATILDA GOERTZ SPEAKS

On February 1-3, 1951, the American Physical Society held its Annual Meeting at Columbia University in New York. Session X, held on Saturday afternoon, was of special interest to members of the Society of Women Engineers.

The general subject of this session was Metals. However, the paper which proved most interesting was one entitle "Heat Treatment of Iron-Silicon Alloys in a Magnetic Field." This paper was presented by one of the Charter Members of our Society, Miss Matilda Goertz.

"In an investigation of the magnetic properties of iron-silicon alloys," Miss Goertz's paper states, "it has been found that heat treatment in a magnetic field is effective foralloys containing between two and ten percent silicon."

DR. LILLIAN GILBRETH HONORARY MEHBER

Dr. Lillian M. Gilbreth, prominent woman engineer and an authority on time and motion study has accepted Honorary Membership in the Society of Women Engineers.

"I appreciate the honor and I hope that I may be a useful member of the Society," said Dr. Gilbreth in her letter of acceptance.

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CENTENNIAL OF ENGINEERING

The Centennial of Engineering program observes the 100th anniversary of the founding of the American Society of Civil Engineers. The observance honors engineers in every branch of the profession because in 1852 civil engineering comprised all except military engineering.

A dynamic integrated exhibit has been set up, and will continue for five years. A dramatic stage production will be presented during the summer of this year, and a convocation of almost 50 national and international engineering societies and associations will be held during the period of September 3-13, 1952. These events will be held in Chicago because of its central location.

Some of the specific aims of the Centennial are:

- —to make known the contributions of engineers to national progress
- —to personalize the engineer in his true role
- to stimulate young people to study engineering

Along with other societies, the SO-CIETY OF WOMEN ENGINEERS has been asked to participate in the Centennial. A Centennial Convention Committee has been established, and is now actively at work making all arrangements. Mrs. Evelyn S. Jetter heads the Policy Committee; Miss Aileen Cavanaugh, Technical Programming; and Mrs. Dot Merrill and Mrs. Lois G. McDowell jointly head the Operations Committee.

On September 5 the **S.W.E.** will hold a luncheon, technical program and dinner. Moderators at the technical program will be Miss Emma Barth and Miss Mary Louise Pottle. Some of the speakers will be Mrs. Mary F. Blade, Miss Elsie Eaves, Mrs. Evelyn S. Jetter, Miss Elsie McGill, Miss Marie Reith, and Miss Katharine Stinson. The Dinner speaker will be Dr. Lillian M. Gilbreth.

Plans are being made for an informal program for September 6. This will include trips to several of the industrial plants, featuring one to a steel mill, in the Chicago area.

A Salute to Women Engineers will be the topic of the Western Society of Engineers. Miss Beatrice A. Hicks will be a guest speaker at one of their sessions.

The official convention hotel for the **S.W.E.** will be the Drake Hotel, and all convention sessions will be held at the headquarters of the Western Society of Engineers.

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
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SPOTLIGHT ON ...



MARY LOUISE POTTLE

Mary Louise Pottle, a pert, blonde, blue-eyed young woman is a SWE member who is active in both her Section and in the National organization.

A native of North Weymouth, Massachusetts, she is an Office Engineer with Allis-Chalmers Corporation in Boston doing inside sales work.

Miss Pottle attended primary and secondary schools in her home town. While in high school she wanted to take mechanical drawing and was told, "Girls don't do that." Here, she decided, was a girl who would. Later, when she decided to study mathematics and applied sciences and, of course, mechanical drawing, an admissions officer at Northeastern University suggested she enroll as an engineering student.

During her undergraduate years she did some part-time surveying and was a laboratory assistant to one of her teachers who at first had seemed hostile to women in engineering and had later proved to be a true friend. Prior to her Junior year Miss Pottle left school temporarily to work for Mathewson Machine Works in North Quincy as an estimator and draftsman. After six months she returned to school and was the second woman to receive a Bachelor of Mechanical Engineering from Northeastern University. Upon graduation she joined Allis-Chalmers.

Since her job-hunting days her biggest peeve has been people who, when they learn she is an engineer, innocently ask, "Do you know how to use a slide rule?"

Miss Pottle has been active in the SWE since its inception. She was the first Chairman of the then New England Section. At the present time she is a Section Director on the Board, Co-Chairman of the By-Laws Committee and is Chairman of the Boston Membership Committee.

As Superintendent of the Primary Department of Pilgrim Congregational Sunday School in her town Miss Pottle supervises 105 children.

Her spare time is taken up with sewing and reading anything that is nontechnical. She knits Christmas presents "like mad," and she attends the theatre whenever possible.

Miss Pottle, an interesting young woman, is an interested one as well.



During the year 1953-1954 the following new Sections applied for charters:

Cleveland Kansas City Denver Drexel (Student)

Connecticut Ohio Valley Purdue (Student)

San Francisco Bay Finger Lakes Pacific Northwest St. Louis

We now have a total of 20 Sections.

Our membership according to the official treasurer's records as of May 25, 1954 was 444. The Section Affiliations and Statistical Committees now have a list of prospective members which contains more than 1,000 names.

The Board of Directors held two meetings during the year-the first at Detroit on July 18 and 19, and the second in Washington at the time of the convention. At the latter meeting it was agreed that the Society change from the publication of a quarterly journal to a monthly newsletter and investigate possible publication of a yearbook.

The convention in Washington was our most successful to date. In addition to the 113 visitors who registered, a large number of guests attended individual sessions without registering. theme of the convention was "The Woman Engineer in a Peacetime Economy." It attracted widespread attention, and we were given unusually good coverage by the press, radio, and television. The recipient of the SWE Award was Miss Edith Clarke, who was recognized for her contributions to the field of electrical engineering. Several of our members participated in the convention program, and the banquet speaker was Dr. A. V. Astin, of the National Bureau of Standards.

The Washington Award was presented to a woman engineer for the first time when Dr. Gilbreth received it for her outstanding



PRESIDENT'S REPORT ON NATIONAL ACTIVITIES OF THE SOCIETY OF WOMEN ENGINEERS, 1954-55

The year 1954-55 was another of growth and activity for the SWE. All of the Sections have received their charters and we now have 18 Sections and four Student Chapters, two new student groups having been organized at the University of Colorado and the City College of New York.

The Professional Guidance and Education booklet, which contains papers and speeches as well as statistical data on women engineers, was completed; the first copies were distributed at the Convention. This publication should be extremely useful to the Sections in education and guidance activities.

The first Regional Conference was held in Philadelphia, with approximately 60 members and guests from seven Sections attending the two-day session. The Eastern Seaboard group is planning a conference to be held next year in Boston. It is expected that other Sections, particularly those remote from the national convention site, will hold similar meetings.

The SWE was one of the engineering societies participating in the 75th anniversary celebration of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers held at Stevens Institute of Technology, Hoboken, N. J. The society was also represented at numerous functions and meetings, including the conference on the Effective Use of Womenpower sponsored by the Department of Labor in Washington.

The publicity received by the Society through articles about the members continues to increase. Particularly good coverage was given to our Convention, with special interest being shown in the presentation of the award to Dr. Margaret Hutchinson for her outstanding work in the field of chemical engineering.

A new administrative policy was finitiated to lessen the time required to process membership applications. Applicants' names are now published in the Newsletter upon receipt of the application instead of after approval by the Board of Directors, thereby making the 30-day waiting period concurrent with the Board's review.

The SWE was requested to cooperate with the Women's Bureau of the U. S. Department of Labor in conducting another survey. This is the first time that a survey of a particular group has been repeated, but the Women's Bureau considered it desirable because of the large increase in our membership and mailing list

since 1953. The result of this survey will be used by the government and industry as a basis for further study of women in the technical labor field. The SWE is proud of its part in this project.

I should like to take this opportunity to express my personal gratitude to the officers, committee chairman, and members for their support and cooperation during the past two years.

REPORT ON "MAN AND WIFE TEAMS" PROGRAM

The advance notice of the June 16 evening at the New York Chapter of the Society for the Advancement of Management, "Man and Wife Teams in Management and Engineering," had forecast a particularly special event, and so it turned out to be. A total of 180 guests, including several SWE members, heard the informative talks of 23 teams. Under the direct and able guidance of Mrs. Wallace Clark, the meeting proceeded at a rapid pace, and each of the members of the teams spoke briefly on some phase of their work or relationship. Beatrice Hicks introduced the eight SWE teams represented. (Editors note: Miriam and Morton Gerla were one of the teams.)

Among the couples present, in addition to the engineering group, were husbands and wives from the medical, teaching, lecturing, editorial, management consulting, and labor relations fields. The satisfaction of mutual understanding in solving similar work problems was mentioned by many speakers, but the difficulties of maintaining a normal home life and raising children were also pointed out. One husband spoke of his damaged ego when, expecting to talk to his wife about his day's work, he found himself listening to her problems instead. Another said his wife's understanding of his business enabled him to expand his activities.

Several career wives felt that a special type of husband is needed if the wife is also to be successful and happy in her work—a husband who feels and expresses sympathetic understanding and who takes pride in the things his wife does. Applause and shouts of "Hear, hear" followed the statement that the modern husband gets too little recognition for his part in the team work, especially when he also does some of the housekeeping and cares for the children along with his wife.

WOMEN ENGINEERS IN THE NEWS

The 1955 Convention resulted in considerable and widespread publicity for the Society of Women Engineers. The following has been reported to the Newsletter:

Advance stories on the Convention appeared on June 13 in the Los Angeles Mirror-News, Herald Express and Industrial News. The Douglas Airview News carried an article on Mr. W. W. Hunter, who was to speak on missile development. The June 17 issue of Hughes Tool Company Aero News had a story on the ten Hughes employees taking part in the Convention and featured a photograph of Frances Rittamel and Sally La Forge.

As the Convention date drew near, the *Torrance Herald* of June 22 carried a story on Kay Broughton and Frances Rittamel, and the *Los Angeles Times* featured a picture of Frances with Katherine Stinson. The *Pittsburgh Post-Gazette* of June 20 reported that Emma C. Barth, Jo Godley, and Katherine Kellar would attend the Convention.

The Lockheed Star of June 23 had an article with a photograph of Doris Gainor, national Treasurer-elect, and the San Fernando Valley Times of June 25 also mentioned Doris in connection with the Convention. The Hughes Aero News of June 24 carried another notice. Radio publicity was presented on the same day over stations KTTO and KFAC.

On June 25 the news story that Dr. Margaret Hutchinson had won the 1955 SWE award was carried in the Los Angeles Mirror-News and Herald Express and in the Hollywood Citizen-News, while the Los Angeles Times featured a photograph of the five officers of the Los Angeles Section. The Times presented more Convention stories on June 26 and 27.

SECOND ANNUAL EASTERN SEABOARD CONFERENCE, FEBRUARY 25-26

Members of several Sections have just spent two days in Boston at the Eastern Seaboard Conference, seeing old friends and making new ones, exploring the historical wonders of Boston, and being inspired to attempt more and bigger Section projects.

It might be well to explain to those Sections which were not represented, that this conference is not set up in the By-Laws of the Society. Last year, however, the Philadelphia Section planned and called an Eastern Seaboard Conference, to provide a get-together for members who were not able to travel as far as the national Convention in Los Angeles. The occasion proved so enjoyable and worthwhile that it was agreed to continue the conference idea.

It is hoped that the idea will be taken up by other geographical regions and so give more members the opportunity of meeting the girls in neighboring Sections. As many national officers and committee chairmen as possible attend the conference and so give more members a close-up of the national organization. Instead of tending to cut down on Convention attendance, the conference provides so much enjoyment and stimulation, that more members start to think about attending the national Convention.

What's Going on in SWE?

The conference was held at the beautiful, modern Faculty Club of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. Mary Pottle, chairman of the Boston Section, presided over a meeting at which Section Chairmen and national Committee Chairmen were invited to make reports.

Beatrice A. Hicks, Chairman of the Development Committee, announced that the national Board of Directors of SWE has just approved resolutions setting up both a Headquarters Fund and a Scholarship Fund for the Society. (See "Society Establishes Two Funds", page 5)

Aileen Cavanagh, Admissions Chairman, made a plea for filling out application blanks in great detail, especially if an applicant who is doing engineering work but does not have an engineering degree, applies for full membership. She warned us to remember that the members of the Admissions Commitee "are not mind readers."

The first Section called upon was Hartford. According to Adele Kutzleb, the group started holding meetings last summer, and has had an attendance of around 20 to 25 at each meeting. A representation of 9 was present in Boston. The Section is waiting for national certification of the required number of members, so that a charter can be granted.
